

Highlights from the November Speech from the Throne

(from CFUW National web site)

It was an historic moment as Governor General Mary Simon, the first Indigenous person to hold this position, delivered the speech in English, French and Inukitut. A number of CFUW priorities were addressed in the speech. Here are a few.

Early Learning and Child Care

-promised to continue building a Canada wide, affordable childcare system

Climate Change

-acknowledged plans to invest in public transit, cap and cut oil and gas sector emissions, protect our lands and oceans, while respecting traditional knowledge of our Indigenous peoples

Gender Based Violence

-acknowledged the rise in violence against women and girls and committed to move forward with the National Action Plan on Violence against Women and Gender-Based Violence

Indigenous Peoples' Rights

-stated that fighting systemic racism, sexism, discrimination, misconduct and abuse will remain a key priority and strengthened the commitment to survivors of residential schools

Gender Equality

-committed to increase the foreign aid budget to promote gender equity around the world

It's important that CFUW Clubs help make sure these promises translate into meaningful policy change. Unfortunately, plans for universal pharmacare, basic income, and reform in the long-term care sector were absent so we must continue to lobby for these.

Programs and Services to assist Seniors with Home Maintenance Tasks by Donna H.

1. The Home and Vehicle Modification Program

The program is available to permanent residents of Ontario who live with a substantial disability that impacts their mobility and daily function, and who can't afford the modifications they need to maximize their independence.

The Program Guidelines outline exactly who can apply for funding, and what kind of modifications are covered. Please read it carefully to make sure you, and the modifications you need, are both eligible.

2. Snow Clearing Assistance in Oshawa

The City of Oshawa provides snow clearing assistance to residents 65 years of age or older, and people with disabilities who have no resident without disabilities under the age of 65 living in the household. The Snow Clearing Assistance Program provides registered residents with assistance in clearing city sidewalks and driveway windrows. The windrow is the pile of snow at the bottom of the driveway that is left after a snowplow clears the street.


