



#### WHAT WE LEARNED ABOUT AGING IN PLACE

The Advocacy Committee members are sharing their learning experiences on the topic of Aging in Place.

Submitted by Melanie K - I already knew much about what it takes to support an adult with significant physical and mental needs in our society before I dove into the topic of aging in place with the advocacy committee. What I didn't know was how many things in Ontario don't work the way they are supposed to. For citizens to age in place requires cooperation and planning together from all levels of government and many different departments.

- Accessible housing and universal design need to be part of the building code.
- Ontario needs LTC regulations that are actually enforced and keep the residents at its center. Big business must not be in charge of LTC.
- Options to LTC such as home care and community supports on a continuum of support, are needed for both large and small urban areas as well as rural areas.
- Preserving green spaces is important to our mental health and climate change.
- Poverty among seniors, the working poor and those with disabilities is real. They may have a roof over their heads but not enough food to stay healthy.

Insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results. That seems to be what our government is doing. But advocacy is hard and will probably not benefit those that are pushing for the changes needed to make our society a better more welcoming space for all. We build on the work of those before us and celebrate the small wins we do get. We don't stop. We can't stop.

Submitted by Janet N - Having been a small part of the 2022 planning, researching, and reporting undertaken by the Advocacy Committee, I am now experiencing the insider challenge of dealing with a chronic medical situation and trying to stay in our house. What have I learned over the past few months? Hospital personnel are so used to their systems, they think you know the systems too, so you need to dig for information. I have learned that it helps to know the questions to ask, but when you don't know, you must ask anything that comes to mind. There will be a trail, but it is obscure at times and the answers are like puzzle pieces. I have learned that decisions, important decisions, are made without your knowledge and participation. I have learned that the Home and Community Care program is working and doing its best. We have a nurse at intervals. We have PSW's coming twice a day for which I am so very grateful, as they are mostly scheduled for morning and evening ablutions. I am learning that equipment is supplied, and we are given time to experiment and figure out what is needed. I am learning that insurance companies want a prescription for the equipment you do decide to keep. I am learning that using an accessible taxi service for appointments can leave you stranded. I am learning that internet research is very helpful and probably necessary.

Submitted by Hedy G - The first thing that I learned is that a survey in Ontario showed that 95% of seniors want to age at home and stay in their community and avoid institutionalization. Having participated in various webinars offered by CFUW and Seniors for Social Action with speakers from across Canada, there are many alternatives to Long Term Care homes. Models like PACE (Program of All Intensive Care of the Elderly) and HUB AND SPOKE which provide supports in older adults' apartment buildings are excellent options and cheaper economically. I was surprised

to discover how little money is being invested by the provincial government to support community care which would keep seniors in their homes longer.

Submitted by Jone W - Here we are, Ontario boomers in our 70's and 80's, no longer living 'la vida loca' as we start to experience physical and mental limitations on our former carefree lifestyles. The living arrangement that most of us have grown accustomed to is couples or singles living on their own. The old folks are expected to move to a 'retirement community' or long-term care (LTC) facility when they can no longer live independently. The reality, however, is that retirement communities are very costly (beyond the means of many), while LTC's have long waiting lists for admission and some have horror stories of poor treatment of residents. As a society, Ontario governments and citizens need to put more emphasis on living in the community where possible, as a viable cost-effective alternative. Aging at home needs to be a feasible option. We boomers need to know what services are available and be able to access them easily and quickly to continue to enjoy living in our homes and communities.
