# Resolution 1- Canada Health Act and Common Application of Medically Necessary Services Proposer-Markham/Unionville Club

#### CFUW Oshawa: and District: The 60s and 70s

These two decades were marked by numerous cultural events. In 1960 Ways and Means organized a Gala Theatre Night at the Plaza Theatre. The lobby displayed an art exhibit of works by art students of Miss Van Leuven and Miss Miochic and, upon arrival, attendees were entertained by the Navy band before the showing of a film of the Royal Ballet.

The following year 835 tickets were sold for the showing of the award- winning film Black Tights, a four-part segment of dance starring Cyd Charisse, Moira Shearer and Zizi Jeanmarie. The film is available on You Tube. In 1971 the Don Cossack Dance Troupe were brought in to raise funds for a donation to the first Kiwanis Music festival and the first Durham College Scholarship.

In addition, the Club sponsored many theatre groups to come to Oshawa and present plays for children and adults.

Our commitment to education went beyond scholarships; school volunteers from both inside and outside the Club were recruited and trained and two career counseling days aimed at counteracting sex stereotyping for girls were organized.

Club interest groups included Crafts, Bowling, Food with Flair, Literary and Travel Clubs and International Relations. Bridge lessons were offered and visits to the sick were made. Members produced and presented a television show of interest to women. In April 1965, the 20th anniversary of the Club, we were pondering how to attract new members; by 1977 membership reached 222. Four delegates were sent to the IFUW in Mexico City.

Annual Reports were mimeographed by students at Donavon Collegiate, a far cry from the ease of the computers we use today.

Programs then, as now, reflected the concerns of the times and included: Should Mothers work? Drugs: Their Use and Misuse (still current), The Great Pill Debate, Female Sexuality, The New Morality: Its Effect upon Youth, The Influence of TV upon Children. Some of the lighter topics were Research on Irish Queens, Shaw Festival's need for a proper playhouse, a tour of Durham College and My Life among the Eskimos. Our most honoured guest speaker was Pauline McGibbon.
