

On Saturday, February 24, Ontario Council held a webinar on AI Ethics Probe. This was attended by three of our club members - Sheila L., Sirpa H. and Hedy G.

On Thursday, February 29, Melanie K and Hedy G registered for the National Advocacy Gathering where 85 participants shared their local advocacy work. In our breakout rooms, we discussed our group's work on Aging in Place and mentioned our 10-page booklet completed in 2022 by six members of our Advocacy group. GREAT NEWS - Heather Oxman, the national VP Advocacy chair has now shared our booklet with clubs all across Canada. Kudos to CFUW Oshawa and District!

On Saturday, March 23, Donna H. and Hedy G. listened to a Zoom presentation entitled *Canada's Food (In)Security and Why WE are All at Risk*. This session raised concerns about our lack of a domestic food system and what we should do about it.



Advocacy Report... Did you know?

Advocacy works!

- Ontario Health Teams (OHT) are a new way of organizing and delivering care that is more connected to patients in their local communities. https://www.ontario.ca/page/ontario-health-teams.
- OHT have replaced the LHIN who are now called Home and Community Care Support Services.
- Durham Region is one of (19) accelerator teams. OHT are required to address priorities the Ministry has set... one of which is Home Care Modernization. Ontario Health has a strong interest in establishing an Aging in Place continuum within OHTs to help people age in place.
- Oshawa is getting a PACE program (Program of All-inclusive Care of the Elderly). Ajax and Port Perry municipal councils are lobbying for one too.
- The Ontario Government has included \$2B more for Home Care in the March 2024 budget.
- A number of other CFUW clubs are advocating for Aging in Place.
- CFUW National has two resolutions affecting seniors.




In Case you missed it.....

- Melanie reported on the new Ontario Health Teams. (See Advocacy report, page 5)
- Hedy spoke about the destruction of library books. In the spring of 2023, the trustees in the Peel Public School Board ordered that books published before 2008 be removed from the shelves in school libraries and sent directly to the landfills. There was no community engagement or transparency in this action. Parents and educators have spoken up against this decision.
- Janet N. reported on an online government survey that seems biased in favour of the fossil fuel consumption lobby.
